Our friend Mr. Sam Hanna has taken his holidays in Switzerland this year and knowing his keenness and his skill at photography we expected a film of unusual interest. We were not disappointed as a magnificent coloured film was the result.

Mr. Hanna knows how to capture the intrinsic beauty of any scene and he has brought back to us visions of Swiss pastures with herds of cows carrying their huge bells, of woods, valleys, rushing torrents, rivers and mountains as well as of old houses of historic interest and of some of our most famous old cities. Entering Switzerland at Delle, he first covered the Jura region and here he had several shots of the old town of St. Ursanne that were of great beauty, followed by views of the walled town of Morat, Fribourg the home town of our President, and of Gruyères, all with a profusion of details. For instance he kept returning to the communal fountain at Gruyères where women were washing their clothes, a fact that must have fascinated him apparently, but it made a pretty picture. We were shown also many well known places, such as the trouts in the Blue Lake (Blausee) the village of Lauterbrunnen, scenes of Lucerne with always the emphasis on the personal such as women doing their purchases at the market at Lucerne, and so on.

Mr. Hanna then showed us, in contrast, two films of some of the nicest parts of England, the Lake District and Wharfedale. We had an opportunity of witnessing the sports and both Grasmere and Burnsall. And after this we cannot agree that there is in England scenery that can compare favourably with our Swiss landscape. Mr. Hanna is quite justified in his ambition to showing to the youth of his country the beauties of their homeland.

Now our member Mr. W. Allenspach has also been abroad this year and has brought back films of his travels. He took us to Egypt with views of the Sphinx and the Pyramids and both his wife and himself riding on swaying camels. Then to Italy, to Venice with its beautiful buildings and canals with elaborately carved gondolas, to Rome the Eternal City and finally back through Switzerland.
