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Dr. Eduard Zellweger, formerly Swiss Federal Minister to Yugo-Slavia, who was elected a Member of Parliament (National Council) in the last autumn elections, is relin-quishing his seat, having been asked by the President

of the Government of Lybia to act as his adviser on constitutional matters.

His successor in the National Council will be Rudolf Welter (Socialist), Central Secretary of the "Schweiz. Kaufmännischer Verein (born, 1911).

Colonel Jaques Bullet (Estavayer-le-Lac) has been nominated Deputy to the chief of the Swiss Delegation in Korea. He will replace Colonel Albert Meyer.

Arrangements to govern Anglo-Swiss trade for the remainder of 1956 were made during recent discussions in London between Swiss and United Kingdom delegations. Most imports from the United Kingdom into Switzerland and from Switzerland into the United Kingdom are free from quantitative restrictions. The current trade arrangements make provision for bilateral quotas for the products which are neither liberalized nor the subject of global quotas.

Mr. Sean O'Kelly, President of Eire has arrived in Zurich for a holiday in Switzerland. The Government of the canton of Zurich has given a reception and banquet in his honour.

Monsieur Raoul Aguirve Molina, has presented his credentials as Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary of the Republic of Argentina to Dr. Markus Feldmann, President of the Swiss Confederation.


The three principal Christian communities in Switzerland have just sent a joint appeal to the civil authorities to ban motor racing.

Britain was the fourth biggest exporter of cars to Switzerland in 1955, exporting 6,340 cars. West Germany, with 31,106 cars was tre biggest exporter, followed by the United States and France.

The cost of sending a Swiss contingent of 60 to the 1956 Olympic Games in Melbourne will be about £33,500, the Swiss Olympics Committee estimates.

The Swiss sport-tote football pools fund will cover 90 per cent of travel expenses, 80 per cent of accommodation expenses in the Olympic village, and all insurance and vaccination expenses.

The Swiss contingent will comprise 42 competitors, 12 officials, two gymnastic judges, and four other people.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS.

Traffic accidents in Switzerland are unfortunately still increasing, as the following figures show: Canton Lucerne: 1,989 accidents were reported in 1955 (1954: 1,912). 52 persons were killed (1954: 50)

and 1,224 were injured (1954: 1,222).

Canton Zug: 441 accidents (1954: 408), 7 persons killed and 324 injured (1954: 289). Canton Neuchâtel: 961 accidents (1954: 913), 26 persons were killed, and 866 (1954: 811) were injured. [A.T.S.]
