I am rather late indeed in giving you some information about the visit to Glasgow and Balloch of our Ambassador and Madame Daeniker. You already have a report from the Ambassador himself, and one also from the Swiss Club Dunfermline, therefore, I will not enlarge very much on the visit. I should just like to say how much the Swiss appreciated this visit from the Ambassador and Madame Daeniker.

We had a gathering of Swiss from Balloch and Glasgow in the famous Restaurant Ferrari, of which Mr. Guido Ferrari, our compatriot, is the proprietor. About 50 Swiss were greeted by the Ambassador and Madame Daeniker. Also present were the President of the Swiss Club Dunfermline, Mr. B. Frick, and Mrs. Frick, the President of the Swiss Club Balloch, Mr. H. Berli, and Mrs. Berli, and Mr. Guido Ferrari, Secretary of the Swiss Benevolent Fund. The Ambassador's speech was much appreciated by our compatriots, as so many questions which they had in mind, were explained in a careful and clear manner.

After the visit, whenever I met any of the Swiss from Balloch or Glasgow, I always heard the same opinion expressed, viz. if only it would be possible for our Ambassador to come oftener to Scotland. Such visits are actually too infrequent. If we could have a visit at least every four years this would be very satisfactory, and would also bring the Swiss closer together to our homeland.
