As in the previous year, all our meetings, with exception of the Film Show, were held at the Swiss Hostel for Girls, which has consolidated its position as the Society's home, and to whose Management we are indebted for their imaginative and efficient

stewardship.

You will also observe that, with exception of the May meeting, all our speakers were drawn not from abroad, as in previous years, but from the United Kingdom. While we would, of course, appreciate an increased influx of suitable Swiss guests, we were much gratified by the Society's success in enlisting distinguished Englishmen and quite a few of our equally distinguished London Swiss as speakers. It will continue to be the Council's policy to arrange monthly conferences, but Members must be made aware of the fact that, without their active collaboration, it will become increasingly more difficult to find speakers for these meetings. We would, in fact, welcome in this direction, a greater degree of support from the cultural associations of Switzerland.

At the last A.G.M., the President's and the Hon. Treasurer's reports were discussed and agreed. This year's balance sheet shows a most welcome change inasmuch as last year's deficit of £39.6.2 has been turned into a surplus of £60.12.9. This happy result is largely due to reduced expenditure in lecturers' fees, printing and stationery, and sundry expenses.

Once again, we were privileged to enjoy the helpful patronage of our Ambassador, and much practical assistance from the Embassy's diplomatic and consular officers. We would like to express our gratitude to His Excellency and his staff for their much valued collaboration. Our thanks are also due to our old friends and journalistic supporters, Messrs. O. Boehringer and A. Stauffer, of the "Swiss Observer", Messrs. W. Wyler and Burgaezzi of Swissair, Messrs. H. O. Ernst, A. Kunz and G. E. Brown of the Swiss National Tourist Office, for their unfailing readiness to support the aims of this Society.

Mrs. M. Meier deserves our thanks for her valiant efforts in cataloguing and the progressive sale of our surplus-library.

Pro Juventute Holiday Scheme for Swiss Children in Great Britain.

The scheme was sponsored again by the Society, with the support of Pro Juventute and the Benevolent Societies of the London and Liverpool colonies, for the benefit of eleven children. Members will have observed a continuous decrease in the number of applicants, and an analysis shows that over the past three years very few children of really necessitous Swiss parents, for whose benefit the scheme has been principally established, have been forthcoming. This is due to manifold reasons, such as children outgrowing the age limit set by Pro Juventute, the many formalities involved, and, undoubtedly, the improved economic conditions of this country. The President and Mrs. Renz, the Agents for Pro Juventute for the last seven years, feel themselves unable to undertake any longer the very considerable work involved, and the Society, after due deliberation, has decided that, in view of all the circumstances, they would not assume sponsorship for 1959.

Journée des Suisses à l'Etranger.

This was held at the end of August at Baden and Zürich. It witnessed the consolidation of the Solidarity Fund Scheme and further progress towards the establishment of new legislation with regard to Military Tax and Invalidity Insurance. A full report of the proceedings was published by the President, representing the Society, in the "Swiss Observer". Mr. A. F. Suter (accompanied by Mrs. Suter) and Dr. H. W. Egli attended in their capacity as members of the Ausland-Schweizer-Kommission of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique.

Membership.

The Society deeply regrets the deaths of their old members Messrs. F. Kibiger and E. F. Sommer. Nine members resigned and twelve members were admitted. A check of our membership records shows a total of 175 members.

The Society has pledged its collaboration in favour of this major cultural and industrial manifestation of Switzerland in the United Kingdom. Members are invited to give their maximum support so as to ensure its resounding success.
