J. J. SCHAD \dagger (J.J.F.S.)

"The Day Thou gavest, Lord, is ended". On 12th October, Mr. J. J. Schad, of 63 Cornwall Road, Cheam, Surrey, passed away at St. Helier Hospital, after a short illness, in his 79th year.

By his death the "Swiss Observer" has lost one of its oldest and most faithful collaborators, and the editor a steadfast and loyal friend of many years' standing.

Who amongst our readers does not recall some of the many interesting articles, translations of Swiss patriotic and folklore songs into English, and above all his clever reviewing of books.

Though a successful business man — he was for many years closely associated with the rubber trade as manager, and subsequently as managing-director, of Messrs. Pargola Limited of 37 to 38 Fenchurch Street in the City of London, until his retirement in 1955 — he was an intellectual, widely-read, with a predilection for history and the classics. Poetry, too, appealed strongly to him as could be perceived by his many translations into English verse of most of the well-known Swiss folk songs. Some real gems of his own verse, sonnets, essays and literary reviews have appeared in our paper for the last thirty years.

This prolific output has been achieved in his spare time, and at odd moments. By his pen he has given readers of the "Swiss Observer" untold pleasure, and if this publication has, in spite of many difficulties, achieved a certain popularity in the Swiss colony of Great Britain, it is in no small measure due to the dear departed.

J. J. Schad, was born and educated in Basle, his father came from Ziefen, a village less than twenty miles from that town; his mother was a native of the canton of Aargau. The Schads were well-known in the "Baselbiet", where they have been peasant smallholders for generations past; one of them, Uli Schad, became famous as one of the leaders of the peasant rebellion in the 17th century. The rising was surpressed and Uli Schad was executed in Basle in 1653. His memory, and that of the other leaders, is perpetuated by a monument, the "Bauern Denkmal" in Liestal.

Mr. J. J. Schad came to this country in 1904. He was a "Membre Passifs" of the City Swiss Club for over fifty years, and an honorary member since 1958. For health reasons he was, during the last few years, seldom seen at functions in the Colony.

He leaves a widow, a daughter, and two sons, to whom we express our deep sympathy in their sad bereavement.

And now, dear friend John, the parting has come, and, in this hour of darkness and grief, I am sending to you from beyond the grave grateful and affectionate thanks for so many precious and happy hours spent in your company, hours which will for ever remain in grateful memory.

It is an old belief, that on some distant shore, beyond the sphere of grief, dear friends shall meet once more; until then, dear friend, sleep in perfect peace.
