Odds and Ends

In the business world of Western Switzerland the main Autumn event is the "Comptoir Suisse" in Lausanne. This 42nd "National Fair" for the promotion of industry, agriculture, trades and commerce lasts from 9th to 24th September. The complete reconstruction of the north area has provided the Fair Authorities with sufficient space for the introduction of new sections. One of the most important events will be the four prize markets and the dog show, due to be held in the modern stable

In the lower part of the sunny Valais, the "Valais Romand", the busy town of Martigny will be holding its own Fair from 30th September to 8th October. The first ten days of September will also see the Oberland Autumn Exhibition at Thun, while Olten, on the Aare, calls its fair from 30th September to 2nd October the "MIO", and the Autumn exhibition beginning on 28th September in Zurich's Hallenstadion is known as the "Züspa". There will be an ironmongery and hardware fair in Basle from 24th to 26th September; in Geneva the "Journées Paysannes" will take place during the last three days of September.
