The second and fully revised edition of Hugh Merrick's excellent book, "The Great Motor Highways of the Alps", has just been published by Robert Hale Ltd., of London. This publication, which describes eighteen major trans-alpine passes and thirty essential subsidiary links, is illustrated with maps and 25 pages of superb photographs. The book is on sale at 35s.

The new aerial cableway Curtinatsch — Piz Lagalb, being inaugurated this month, opens delightful new ski slopes with a view point at 9,500 feet above sea level. The distance covered by the new cabins is 2,600 yards, with a difference in height of approximately 2,600 feet; 510 persons can be carried per hour. The starting point is near the lower station of the Bernina — Diavolezza cableway. From the Bernina Railway Station, "Ospizio Bernina", at 7,400 feet, a new 1,440-yard-long skilift now hauls skiers to the Piz Crocetta, at 8,340 feet, in only ten minutes; 420 persons can be conveyed per hour. The principal attraction of the new downhill runs is the 10½-mile-long descent via La Rösä — San Carlo to Poschiavo.

THE NEW "CAFETERIA" IN ZURICH'S CENTRAL STATION

In Zurich's Central Station, the first-class restaurant has been expanded to include a self-service style cafeteria, part of which has been laid out as a snack bar. Designed on very pleasing lines by architects M. Fehr and A. Notter, of the Swiss Federal Railways, it is primarily intended to serve travellers wanting to eat a light meal in a few minutes. It is open every day from 6 a.m. till midnight. From then until 4 a.m. it is reserved for air passengers arriving in the "wee hours".



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
