HIGHLIGHTS OF THE COMING WINTER
SPORTS SEASON

This October's generous snowfalls seem to indicate an excellent sportsman's winter ahead. This is particularly good news for the many pre-season training courses for the guest-skiers in various resorts. In addition to the well-known Swiss Ski School Instructors' Course, to be held this year in *Montana-Crans*, and the Wedel-Course in *Zermatt* which has become a traditional event, there is a wide range of refresher courses scheduled for early and mid-December in *Pontresina*, *St. Moritz*, *Davos*, *Klosters*, *Grindelwald-First* and many other towns. Those interested in participating should inquire at the Tourist Office or the Ski School of the resort concerned. In the field of winter spectator-sports, the following are among the most notable events ahead: The International Ice Hockey

Spengler Cup Tournament, Davos (26th-30th December); the Ninth International Alpine Ski Days, Grindelwald (5th-8th January); the International Lauberhorn Ski Races, Wengen (9th-10th January); the International Nordic Ski Races, Le Brassus (16th-17th January); the International Ski Jumping Week, which opens in Unterwasser (24th January), then moves on to St. Moritz (25th-26th January), Arosa (28th January) and Le Locle (31st St. Moritz (30th-31st January); the Second Tobogganning World Championship, Davos (6th-7th February); the First Alpine Ski Championship of the Alpine Countries, Davos (11th-14th February); the International Military Ski-ing World Championship, Andermatt (28th February-8th March), with participants from ten to twelve nations; the "Coppa Grischa" Alpine Ski Championship, Lenzerheide and St. Moritz (7th-14th March). Approximately one thousand additional events, athletic, social and cultural, are listed in the pamphlet "Winter Events in Switzerland 1964/65 and Preview of the Summer Events 1965" just published by the Swiss National Tourist Office, Zurich.
