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BROWN BOVERI COCKTAIL PARTY CIMAC 1965 — LONDON

The objects of CIMAC (Congrès International des Machines à Combustion) are to promote technical and scientific knowledge in the field of internal combustion

engines (engines and turbines).

The Congress was organised for the first time in Paris in 1951. In 1953 it took place in Milan, 1955 in The Hague, 1957 in Zurich, 1959 at Wiesbaden and in 1962 in Copenhagen. The Congress has grown into a triennal occasion.

It has become a tradition for Brown Boveri to invite all participants, with their wives, to a cocktail party which, this year, took place on 28th April at the Dorchester Hotel in London. The guests, numbering about 750 and coming from practically every European country, and other continents, too, were received by Dr. h.c. C. Seippel and Mr. Bernhardt, both members of the Brown Boveri Management; Mr. Herger, Chief Engineer of the Turbocharger Design Department; and Mr. Thomas, Managing Director of British Brown-Boveri. A large contingent of Brown Boveri organzation members were present and endeavoured to make people feel at home. Our congratulations go to Mr. G. A. Ronus of the Dorchester Hotel and to Mr. H. E. von Gunten of British Brown-Boveri for the firstclass organization of this party.

OPENING OF A NEW RESEARCH UNIT

The Swiss Ambassador opened the new Research Division of CIBA at Horsham, Sussex. The Lord Snow, C.B.E., gave a inaugural address in the presence of a The delegation from number of distinguished people. Switzerland was headed by the CIBA President, Dr. R.

In his address, Monsieur de Fischer referred to the intensive period of development in Anglo-Swiss relations in the economic field. The new research unit at the CIBA laboratories for the study of biochemistry, pharmacology and analytical chemistry was the third great investment in England within a short time by Swiss firms or by a mixed enterprise domiciled in Switzerland. At the beginning of the year, Nestlé and its group (Maggi, Findus and Crosse and Blackwell) built St. George's House at Croydon. A few weeks ago, the International Pirelli Company of Basle contributed to the establishment of the Super Tension Cable Factory at Eastleigh. "Other investments by a fourth Swiss firm, Georg Fischer, of Schaff-hausen, are afoot in Bedford", said the Ambassador. "And, as if to reward all these initiatives, the Royal Pharmaceutical Society recently conferred the Hanbury Gold Medal on the internationally-known Swiss scientist, Professor Arthur Stoll, of Basle.

"This expansion of Swiss investments in the United Kingdom is being accompanied by a considerable intensification of Anglo-Swiss trade. This is increasing each year, and in 1964 left Britain with a balance of some 300 million Swiss francs in her favour. This development is a proof both of the friendly welcome given by the United Kingdom to Swiss industry and manufactured products, and of the Swiss economy's interest in the British market. It is also a proof of the success of EFTA and especially of the opportunities for international division of labour and collaboration in the scientific and technical spheres, a subject particularly topical today."

SWISS INDUSTRIES FAIR

The MUBA 1965, the 49th Swiss Industries Fair. took place in Basle from 24th April to 4th May. A record number of 935,000 visitors attended this year's fair, in spite of higher prices of admission. The main interest of the large number of foreign visitors was directed to the watch fair which was held for the thirty-fifth time. "Official Day", the President of the Confederation, Federal Councillor Tschudin, gave the main address. The theme was the relationship between industry and research.

A group of some forty British industrialists made a tour of Switzerland, visiting many manufacturing concerns in several parts of Switzerland. A member of the British

Ministry of Defence was among the visitors.
