The will to maintain a united front, facing in close collaboration whatever the future may have in store for us, has unfortunately somewhat relaxed during the last few years. Far too many of our compatriots living in this country show but little interest in the doings of the Colony, and by standing aloof hasten the disintegration of the community.
