BERTHA M. BERTSCHINGER †

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Mrs. Charles Bertschinger of 47 Barrels Down Road, Bishop's Stortford, Herts. She died peacefully at home in her 83rd year on 21st January. Many of the older generation among our readers will remember her well from the days she shared a rich life with her husband, and when she often acted as "mother" and generous hostess to many young Swiss coming to London for the first time.

It was in the "Swiss Observer" of 13th March 1953 that the then Editor paid tribute to the late Mr. Charles Bertschinger who had been an active member in the Colony. He was instrumental in founding the "Foyer Suisse" and acted as a lay preacher in the Protestant German-speaking community during the first world war (services were in Schwyzerdütsch by request of the Foreign Office) and later helped in founding the "Schweizerkirche".

Now his devoted wife, a remarkable woman, has gone to join him twelve years after his death. We extend our deepest sympathy to her family in their bereavement.
