ZERMATT CARVING PRESENTED TO SUSSEX MOUNTAINEERING CENTRE

In the Church of Our Lady of Minster near Tonbridge there is a statue of a Madonna and child with a dove in her hand. It is that figure which gave Mr. John Walters, Director of the Bowles Rocks Trust Ltd., the Sussex Mountaineering Centre, an idea. He had a photo taken and sent to Zermatt. An artist in woodcarving, Beat Gasser, at Lungern carved a statue copying the photo. It is this statue which was presented to the Sussex Centre by the people of Zermatt on Sunday, 10th July.

The Chapel at Bowles is a copy of the Schwarzsee Chapel near Zermatt, and on that Sunday morning, the Rev. Father J. Scherer of the Swiss R.C. Mission in London, celebrated Mass, followed by the blessing of the statue standing on a pedestal on the wall, There was a full chapel, also for the Anglican Service which was held immediately after the Roman Catholic worship. services were most impressive, and there was some good

singing by student novices.

The climbing installlations were then visited, and at the Club House, the Manager of the Zermatt Tourist Office, Mr. C. Cachin, gave an address. Refreshments were served, and visitors were able to stroll through the extensive grounds with their interesting rock formations used to train amateur and expert mountaineers for difficult climbing.


