The following deaths have been reported in Switzerland recently:

Louis Marti (89), Lausanne, head of the Lausanne branch of the General Posters' Association and one of the first members of the Lausanne Rotary Club.

Léopold Daler (80), Fribourg, former member of the Cantonal Parliament and of the Municipal Council.

Dr. Alphons Haas (84), Einsiedeln, citizen of Laufen (Berne), journalist and one-time President of the Zurich Press Association; for many years Editor of the "Tages Anzeiger".

Major Strasser (61), Frauenfeld, *Kreiskommandant*.

Leo Kilchmann (69), Sursee, farmer and Commune Clerk and for 16 years member of the Lucerne Parliament (Liberal).

Bruno Gherri Moro (68), Sion, well-known Italian painter from the Valais; killed in his car on a level crossing near Sion.

Nold Halder (67), Aarau, author; *Staatsarchivar* for over 20 years.

Karl Dick (82), Basle, well-known landscape painter.

Friedrich Bieri (82), Muensingen, founder of an important Swiss industrial undertaking (pump manufacturer).

Dr. Giuseppe Medici (68), Berne, originally from Mendrisio, former chief medical officer of the Department for Military Insurance of the Federal Military Department (1943-1963).

Dr. Walter Scheitlin (74), St. Moritz, citizen of St. Gall; for 26 years secondary teacher at St. Moritz; Honorary Citizen of the town; member of the Commune Council; author of the first *Ladin* grammar.

Jules Coderey (62), Nyon, well-known fruit grower and Liberal Cantonal M.P.; President of the "Union Fruitière Vaudoise"; father of the actress Corinne Coderey.

Paul Moeckli (77), Delémont, well-known Jura personality; Principal of the "Ecole Supérieure de Commerce"; for many years President of the Commune Assembly; co-founder of the Jura Federation of *Schützenvereine* and President of the Bernese Cantonal Association of the same.

Dr. Max Leutenegger (64), Schwyz, since 1943 Editor of the "Schwyzer Zeitung" and for many years Secretary of the Conservative Party.

Camille Gret (86), Estavayer, former Director of the *Strafanstalt* Bellechasse; Honorary Doctorate of the University of Neuchâtel; Chairman of the Swiss *Strafanstaltskommission*.

Jérémie Frossard (59), Ardon (Valais), Commune President.

Dr. phil. Meinrad Schnellmann (70), Lucerne, former Librarian of the Lucerne Central Library; co-author of the historic/biographic encyclopedia of Switzerland and other historic publications.

Jean Hofmann (73), La Chaux-de-Fonds, Liberal member of the Commune Council for 24 years and of the Cantonal Parliament; *Bezirksrichter*; author of "Les Méfaits du Militarisme Helvétique".

Pfr. Pierre Krieg (70), Belprahon; President of the Swiss Blue Cross; for 25 years Minister at Grandval; Army Padre of the Jura Infantry Regiment 9.

Werner Ruckli (25), Lucerne, goldsmith; murdered in Mexico City.

Pfr. Leopold Lauber (92), Glis near Brigue, priest for 67 years.

Samuel Mueller (74), Flurlingen (Zch.), former Commune President and public figure.

Clara Buettiker (80), Olten, well-known writer of short stories and poetry; founder of the "Schweizerischer Frauenkalender" which she edited for 50 years.

Emil Gut (70), Baar, former Manager of the Zug Cantonal Bank; member of the board of the spinning works of Aegeri; President of the "Inländische Mission der Schweiz"; prominent member of the Swiss R.C. Press Association.

Edmond Bourquin (66), Neuchâtel, lawyer; member of the Radical Party which he represented in the General Council of the town and in the Cantonal Parliament; President of the Neuchâtel Section of the "Touring Club" of Switzerland.

Prof. Heinrich Heusser (72), Basle, well-known surgeon; amongst other offices he held that of President of the Swiss Society for Surgery; member of the Citizens' Council of Basle; President of the *Taubstummenanstalt*; Colonel of General Staff. [A.T.S.]
