NEWS FROM THE COLONY

FLIGHT FORWARD

To leave every day life behind, to go away from problems and people and noise, to find peace in a quiet spot is certainly a sort of flight, although a flight forward, at least for those who do it as a preparation in order to make themselves fit for every day life, to tackle problems and to deal with people in a noisy town.

Ashburnham Place, the old manor of the Ashburnham family near Battlle (Sussex), now converted into a Christian study centre, has become a refuge of this kind for many members and friends of the Swiss Church.

The first flight forward was the camp when from 12th-19th July twenty people, men and women, mothers with children, *au-pair* girls and boys enjoyed quietness, fresh air, sunshine and rain. The time in the morning was devoted to Bible study and discussion on love. The book "Ich liebte ein Mädchen" was a real help and the presence of married people was highly appreciated by most of the

of married people was highly appreciated by most of the girls. In the evenings, work for the First of August celebration and the Church Bazaar was done and a book on prayer was read. There were friendly talks with a group from Eastern Europe. It is very tragic indeed to remember that many of them were Czechs who spoke with enthusiasm about the process of liberalisation in their country.

The second flight forward was the visit to the camp by over a hundred members of the Swiss Church, who, on 14th July, had arrived in two coaches and several private cars in order to attend a special service of induction of four new members of the German speaking Church Parish Council: Mrs. E. Crack, Miss H. Siegrist, Mr. F. Adams and Mr. J. von Wartburg. Much work is awaiting them which they are willing to tackle in a Christian spirit and with joy.

The third flight forward was the "Evangelische Singgemeinde", a well-known choir from Switzerland. Sixtyfive singers "took over" the Christian study centre. The organiser of the choir was Pfr. U. Stefan, the conductor Prof. M. Flämig. After intensive rehearsals at Ashburnham Place, they started their tour through England and Scotland, beginning with a service for the Swiss Community, held at the "Eglise réformée de France" in Soho Square. In Coventry Cathedral, they received the praise of being the second best choir next to Coventry itself. After the concert in Edinburgh, the "Singgemeinde" went on to Iceland to perform in Reiykjavik, Akureyri and on the Icelandic radio.

Thus the sphere of interest of the church's summer programme in connection with Ashburnham Place is wide, ranging from theological and ethical questions to devotion to music, engagement in the leadership of the Church, and involving the hopes and fears of people from other countries. *Marcel Dietler, Pfr.*

A CHANCE FOR CHILDREN TO LEARN GERMAN IN LONDON

The German Cultural Institute intends to arrange courses in German for German-speaking children during the scholastic year 1968/69. The courses should take place at its address at 51 Princes Gate, S.W.7. Two to three hours between 9 a.m. and noon on Saturday mornings are planned. The instruction is based on the standard set by German Middle Schools, and children must be German-speaking and able to read and write, age approximately 7 to 14. SWISS GIFTS FOR LONDON CHARITIES

Over £630 (6,500 Swiss francs) has been received by three London charities from citizens of Zermatt, Switzerland. Of this, £485 (5,000 francs) was given by Dr. Josef Aufdenblatten, President of the famous village.

The three beneficiaries are the Church Music Trust, the Malcolm Sargent Cancer Fund for Children and the Royal Parish Church St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Trafalgar Square.

The connection? Mr. Kurt Kettner, well-known in London for his "Music without Distraction" presentations at St. Martin's and St. Paul's Cathedral. Zermatt was the birthplace of Mr. Kettner's first experiments with stereophony in a blacked out church with only the altar floodlit, and on a recent visit there, after his successful presentation at St. Paul's in aid of the Church Music Trust, he took with his letters from Sir Gilbert Inglefield, Lord Mayor of London, Chairman of the Trust Appeal, and Patron of the Malcolm Sargent Fund, and also from Lord Trevelyan, Co-Chairman of the Fund, addressed to Dr. Aufdenblatten.

Mr. Kettner's first two concerts in this country were presented in St. Martin's with proceeds of the collections given to the church. Then followed the St. Paul's concert in aid of the Trust and it has now been decided that from 1969 onwards all London "Music Without Distraction" presentations here and in Zermatt will be in aid of all three charities; this also applies to any other contributions wherever they may come from.

The Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor of London, Alderman Sir Gilbert Inglefield, Chairman, Church Music Trust Appeal, is again, as he was at St. Paul's Cathedral, the distinguished Patron of the "Music Without Distraction" Concert which Mr. Kurt Kettner will present at the Royal Parish Church of St. Martin-in-the Fields, Trafalgar Square.

All the works in the Exhibition at The Arts Theatre, with one exception, are in oils and are colourful examples of what the artist calls "a search to create a new rich colour world for living in".
