# ACSE'S SPECIAL SUMMER COURSES IN LONDON AND OXFORD

The Editor recently came across an advertisement in a Swiss paper of January 1952, in which an Anglo-Swiss School of Languages in Bournemouth under Fr. Schillig jun. was advertised. That was in the early days of a very successful Swiss venture, today one of the largest and most efficient language centres in Great Britain, the Anglo-Continental School of English, ACSE.

Last year, the school extended its activities to include summer courses at the Chelsea College of Science and Technology. They were such a success that ACSE decided to expand and organise similar courses in Oxford this year. Once again, these have been successful, and facilities will be further increased next year.

The intensive programme of studies consists of a basic programme of twenty compulsory language lessons in the classrooms combined with an optional programme offering a wide range of lectures, additional lessons and special courses. Various excursions are undertaken during the courses, and the students live in, which gives them an added attraction of British University life.

On 14th August, the Directors of ACSE, Mr. F. Schillig and Mr. G. Scheller, Mr. G. Oetiker (Director of Studies) and Mr. M. Wild from the Zurich Office gave a Luncheon at the Chelsea College, at which various educational agents, College Principals and several personalities interested in education in general and in the ACSE ventures in particular, were present. The visitors were taken on a tour of the College and informed that there were 3,100 students at ACSE in Great Britain during the peak period this summer, of whom 350 in London, 350 in Oxford and 2,400 in Bournemouth. Approximately 2,500 Swiss students attend courses during one year.
