SWISS EVENING AT WIMBLEDON

The Swiss Evening of St. Teresa's Maternity Hospital, Wimbledon, held at the Dog and Fox Hotel, Wimbledon, on St. Valentine's Night, 14th February, is reported to have been most successful. A number of previous national evenings have been held by the Friends of the Hospital, in a series of attempts to raise the money required for the new building programme, and this year there was further pressure for funds owing to the withdrawal of National Health Service subsidies in 1967 after a dispute about the length of time nursing mothers should spend in hospital.

The Editor of this journal offered her assistance, and apart from making space available in a recent issue, was also responsible for introductions to many potential well-wishers among the Swiss Community in London, who came forward with a generosity unprecedented in the history of this function.

The Friends of St. Teresa are particularly anxious to convey their thanks to the Ambassador, who made a personal gift of a quantity of wine, and to his staff who were so helpful and some of whom attended the dance. The Embassy also made a magnificent gift of an enamelled clock and a number of dolls in national costume.

A number of other members of the community also came forward with gifts, prizes and donations. These included Mr. Solomon, Mr. and Mrs. B. O. Cogliatti, Mr. A. Kuhn, Mr. E. Bonvin of Kettners', Mr. P. S. Jacomelli of Valchera's, Mrs. M. Speckert, O. Bartholdi & Son, Swissair, Swiss Milk Products, Schweppes and Nestlé. The Swiss National Tourist Office provided a fine selection of posters with which the room was decorated.

Despite all this, the evening could not have succeeded as it did had the two hundred odd dancers not been entertained so well and for so long. After the first session of dancing, the Choir of the Unione Ticinese delighted their audience with a number of folk songs, traditional and more modern, sung with great gusto under the leadership of their accordionist. They were followed by the Trio Arnold Wachter, who sang and yodelled and told their stories to a most appreciative audience.

The band played on and dancing continued into the wee small hours. The irrepressible Shelagh Byfield continued to extract every last gasp of energy from all around her, and it appears that her efforts were rewarded to the tune of £170, by far the best result from a dance ever recorded by the Hospital.
