He was greeted by a most sincere and thunderous applause and he had a good word for everybody, young and old, sitting in a large ring around the tree. CHARLES H. WILLI, A PIONEER PLASTIC SURGEON

As we announced previously, Charles H. Willi died on 27th January at Aigle, where he has had a home for the last few years. He was cremated at Vevey and will eventually be buried in Brigue, where the last of the Willis are now living.

Karl Heinrich Willi was born on 22nd June, 1883 in Lucerne, the son of Johann Willi, engineer of the Jura-Simplon Railway. Their family goes back to 1445, and their ancestral home Willidorf at Oberkirsch-Sursee,

Lucerne.

Charles had his schooling in Lucerne, and at 18 he went to the USA to study medicine, specialising in plastic surgery. After four years he returned to Europe and started practising. At that time, it was quite revolutionary and daring, as it was medically not accepted. He was first in Germany, then in Paris, and in November 1910, the year of Edward VII's funeral, he arrived in London.

Charles Willi had very little money but a lot of self-confidence. He started work in earnest, and he was enormously successful as a pioneer in his field. He was the first and foremost exponent in the art of aesthetic plastic surgery, used not only for facial rejuvenation, but also for restoring faces ravaged by accidents and war wounds, and for correcting malformations.

He practised in London until 1963, performing about 16,000 operations on kings, princes, statesmen, artists and society people, as well as thousands of ordinary men and women

who have reason to be grateful to him.

Many books have been written on his work, and he himself was the author of several publications. Apart from his American M.D., he had several distinctions. He was a member of a French medical academy, a F.R.S.A. and President of the International Society for Plastic Surgery.

He loved his lawn and his beautiful roses in Hampstead's Eton Avenue. He was a keen sportsman, an amateur jockey in his youth, a champion racing cyclist, an excellent horseman, tennis player and swimmer and he was second in the Swiss Figure Skating Champion-

ships about 1922.

He was a member of many Swiss societies in London, notably the Swiss Rifle Association and the City Swiss Club. In 1911, he "called" for his childhood sweetheart, also from Lucerne, Mrs. Marie Willi died some years ago and it is to their daughter Margrit who lives abroad, that our sympathy goes in her bereavement.
