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are over 700 of them) explained to me that the time had come to break this "insularity". There were no reasons to blush about the British Isles' mountaineering opportunities. Obviously, no mountain in Britain was a match with the Eiger, yet there were plenty of tricky climbs requiring consummate skills. I was told that the highest cliff in the British Isles is almost 800 metres high and is on Ben Nevis. Cliffs in North Wales are at most 300 metres high. There are interesting cliffs and dozens of climbing associations in the Lake District. Even Northern Ireland, with a few rocky hills and a number of sea-side cliffs has eleven club huts.
