## MESSAGE FOR THE FIRST OF AUGUST

When celebrating my birthday, I express my joy of being alive, the way I am, different from others. It is done in the company of friends and relatives who share this joy and accept my being different – at least on my birthday. It has always been a great experience.

Celebrating the birthday of my country on the first of August I do the same, enjoy the fact of being Swiss and share this joy with anybody who has reason to join in and is prepared to do so. I am not just an anonymous “world-citizen” like everybody else.

I belong to a community of a special country with a special character, formed by a special history, a history which, perhaps, has somehow been distorted and glorified by over-enthusiastic teachers and patriotic history books.

Nevertheless, this history is part of me, my way of life and thinking. And it is a human history with ups and downs, with good and evil.

IN THE NAME OF GOD – AMEN. These are the first words of the document which marks the birth of Switzerland. It is a confession of Faith – Oh, I know, in the name of God our ancestors have built churches and hospitals, have made war and killed each other.

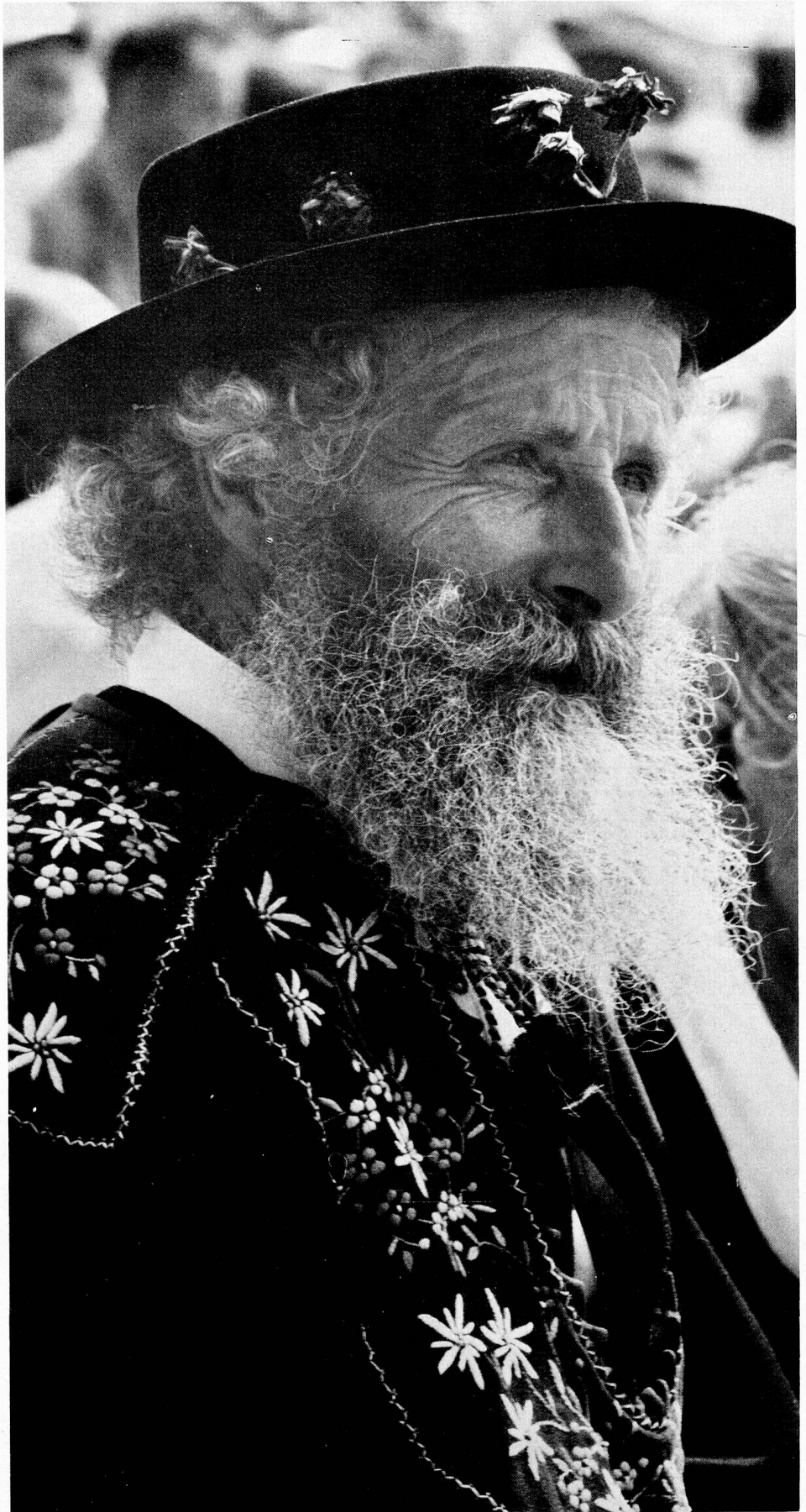

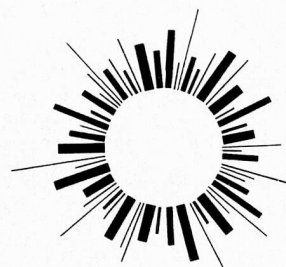
