OBITUARIES

Jacques Oertli

As was announced in the last issue of the *Swiss Observer*. Mr Jacques Oertli, of 13 Osidge Lane, Southgate N14, died peacefully at his home on 7 July, having been ill for some time.

Jacques Oertli was born in Glarus on 10 November 1896. When he left school he made an apprenticeship at the Swiss Credit Bank in whose employment he was from 1913-1919, doing military service at intervals in the first world war. He then spent two years at the Credito Italiano in Milan, followed by another two years in Paris with the Banco di Roma.

In 1923 he arrived in London and spent four months at the Swiss Mercantile Society's College and then joined the staff of the Midland Bank until his retirement in 1961.

When Mr Oertli was 70 and he was asked for some biographical details for the *Swiss Observer* he declined. He was a most modest man and wanted his friends to remember the Swiss Benevolent Society rather than himself. The SBS was most dear to him, and the loyal and painstaking work he did for it for many decades takes pride of place in the annals of the Society. He was one of its

vice-presidents until a few years ago, and he was also an active member of the Swiss Mercantile Society which he joined in 1923.

Jacques Oertli married in 1928, and he leaves a widow and one daughter. It is to them that we express our sincere sympathy. His friends will remember him with great respect and affection.

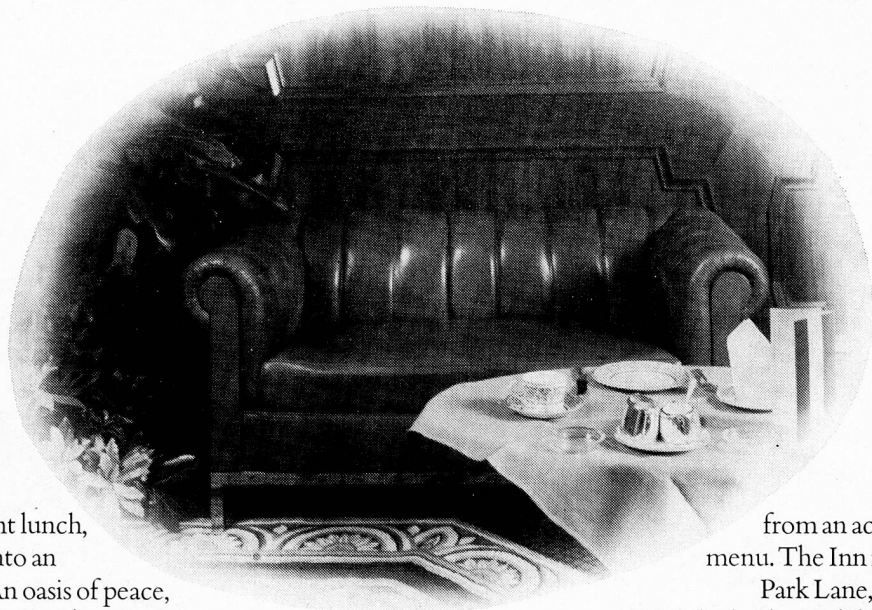
