Dr. CLEMENTE REZZONICO

We regret to inform our readers of the death, which occurred on Wednesday, 25th February last at the St. Anna Nursing Home in Lugano of Dr. Clemente Rezzonico, former Swiss Ambassador, aged 79 years, who in the period in between the two world wars had been a popular member of the London Swiss colony, being generally liked for his

approachability and friendly manner. Clementino, as he was known to his many friends, had first come to London as a student, eventually finding employment in a clerical capacity at the then Swiss Legation. Finding diplomacy to his liking, he went back home to complete his higher studies, and entered the Political Department in Berne. Soon after the end of the First World War Dr. Rezzonico was appointed a Secretary and posted to the London Legation.

During his stay here he was further promoted to Counsellor. Shortly before the outbreak of the second world conflict he returned to Berne. Upon the Indian subcontinent gaining independence in 1946, Dr. Rezzonico was sent as Chargé d'Affaires to open Legations first in New Delhi, and in Karachi, being subsequently accredited as Minister plenipotentiary, later Ambassador. When Switzerland was one of the first countries to establish diplomatic relations with Mao's People's Republic, Dr. Rezzonico set up our Embassy in Peking, where he remained until his retirement. The deceased was a member of the Swiss Mercantile Society. We convey our deepest sympathy to his sisters, and other members of his family. J.E.

PASTOR PETER K. WIPF

It is with deep regret that we report the death, in Sissach, BL, of Pastor Peter Konrad Wipf at the tragically early age of 46.
