WILHELM TELL ON AUGUST 1st

Every summer the Swiss resort of Interlaken is the scene of a remarkable open air performance of Friederich Schiller's play "William Tell". The production, which began in 1912, has become an institution for Swiss and foreign visitors to Interlaken. More than one hundred amateur players take part in the production. It is staged in a beautiful, wooded grotto containing authentic alpine houses true to the style of the 13th-century when the legendary Swiss hero is meant to have lived.

As well as the human cast there are horses and alpine herds of cows, sheep and goats. Many scenes in the play involve very skilful horseback riding by members of one of the local riding schools. Schiller's play tells of the struggle of the Swiss people against tyrannical rule by Austria and of the forming of the alliance between the original Swiss cantons of Uri, Schwyz and Unterwalden.

The famous scene on the Rütli Meadow where men from the three cantons take an oath to free their county is a high point of the play. By now, darkness has fallen on the open-air stage and the whole scene is played out against the background of a fire and flaming torches.

On August the First this year, the Swiss National Day, SBC will be broadcasting a special feature set around the William Tell play at Interlaken. SBC reporters Paul Suftrin and Chris Dickson will present the play and find out from the principal actors what "William Tell" means to them. You will also hear reaction from English-speaking members of the audience and learn how William Tell shoots that famous apple from his son's head without hurting the boy.

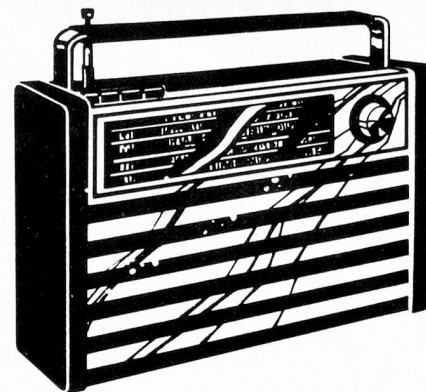
