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# HISTORICAL SETTING FOR

# HIS 'DEBUT'

Fenton House, in Hampstead, belongs to the National Trust. It is one of the earliest and largest houses in that part of North London, dating back to 1693, a beautiful architectural product of the William and Mary period. It is surrounded by a lovely garden. Fenton House contains a fine collection of early keyboard instruments and also valuable china. One of the harpsichords, the largest model made in 18th-century England, was made by Burkat Shudi, a Swiss, and his son-inlaw, John Broadwood, in 1770. This instrument was used at a concert held there on 24th June, 1976. It was under the patronage of the London Group of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, in conjunction with the International Liszt Centre for 19th-Century Music in London.

The setting was perfect on that lovely summer's evening, and the recital room filled with an eager audience. The President of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, Mrs. Mariann Meier, welcomed members and friends of both organisations, as well as of the Swiss Churches, to whom the surplus of receipts was donated. She also expressed gratitude to the three artists, Shuna Wilson (cello), Uli Stefan (recorder and flute) and Lennart Rabes (harpsichord), who were giving their services free.

The programme began Handel's Sonata in A minor, Op. 1, No. 4 for recorder and continuo. The recorder blended beautifully with continuo and harpsichord in a pleasant rendering of an old favourite. Bach's Sonata No. 2 in D for cello and harpsichord was pleasing in tone, played with musical feeling and accompanied with great sensitivity.

The solo Suite No. 2 in D minor for cello was a difficult work, neither easy to play nor to digest. It had great musicality, and was played with expert skill, but there were perhaps not enough differences in character and tonal colour between the movements, no doubt due to the unusually hot evening.

Scarlatti's two sonatas in D minor and C major for harpsichord were a delight in their delicate nuances.

The great surprise of the evening was the first performance in England of the Sonata Op. 2, No. 4 in E minor by the Swiss baroque composer, Gaspard Fritz, born in Geneva in 1716 (died in 1782). He was a distinguished violinist. One of his many works, six solos for cello and harpsichord, is to be found at the British Museum. The sonata played at Fenton House carries a note "Réalisation de la basse chiffrée par Frank Martin", the famous Swiss composer. In this work, all three artists were in complete harmony, and the performance was as expert as it was charming.

Great applause showed the artists how much their fine musical presentation of beautiful compositions had been appreciated.
