## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Sir,

As one of your regular subscribers, I feel I should not let you get away with your comments about conscientious objectors in your December issue.

I do not know whether, by any chance, you heard the Radio 4 talk yesterday evening "The Loneliest Man", and read the two pages in the Radio Times on "Memoirs of Non-fighting Men", of which I enclose a copy for your convenience, which I hope you will be interested to read. So, I am afraid, by your calling Military Service, National Service, you seem to forget that Switzerland is supposed to stand out from other countries as the Island of Peace or the Playground of Europe. This is surely much more in accord with the "Rütli Schwur".

As a matter of fact, as a conscientious objector, I myself deserted from the Swiss army in 1915 when I was serving at the Airolo Fortress, and afterwards started my own business in 1920 with my English wife (née Scott) as Scott Bader & Co, which still exists and flourishes today. It is, however, not merely a traditional business but a common ownership community in the spirit of superseding capitalism with its war-like structure.

Perhaps I might refer to the article which your predecessor published in your paper on 10th January, 1975, giving a report of a talk by Prof. Hollenweger to the Nouvelle Société Helvétique in London. You will see from the article that Hollenweger is in full support of our activities and surely any sensible man must strive for peace rather than war!! Isn't it about time that instead of Military Service, Civil Service should be instituted, particularly in Switzerland, and I am glad that there is now at last a beginning for this change to become reality? I hope that therefore it is not Military Service that is National Service but non-violent Civil Service for the good of everybody.

Might I also refer to the book by Jean Ziegler, as per paper herewith, putting the case of the conscientious objector in Switzerland quite well, I think, and perhaps you will be good

enough to include this book amongst the recommended literature in your Journal.
