OBITUARY

SELMA VAZ DIAS (Mrs. Hans Egli)

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Selma Vaz Dias, known to her friends in the Swiss community as Mrs. Egli, of 17 Corringham Road, London NW11. She died after a long and painful illness in the early hours of 30th August.

Selma Vaz Dias was born in Amsterdam on 23rd November 1911. She came to England at the age of 11 and was educated at Southwood Hall, Highgate, and at Versailles. She studied for the stage at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and made her first appearance at the Little Theatre on 28th February 1929 as Nina Verganskaia in "Red Dust". She was a successful actress and played some great character parts, both in English and in French. Her appearances fill sixty-odd lines in WHO'S WHO IN THE THEATRE. She also appeared frequently for the Stage Society, Lyceum Club, Left Theatre, Under Thirty Players, Masses Stage Guild, etc. She translated "The Wise Cat" produced at the Ambassadors' in 1937 and adapted the novel "Good Morning, Midnight" for the BBC Third Programme; she broadcast it as a monologue in May 1957. She also played in numerous films, radio and television plays and recorded the part of Queen Elizabeth I in the first English presentation of "Son et Lumière" at Greenwich Palace in August 1957. She was a founder of the "First Stage" play reading society.

Some years ago, this very gifted actress turned to painting and had several exhibitions of her portraits and other paintings. She also wrote a great deal and delighted in arranging parties at the Egli Home in Golders Green. Her circle of friends was very large and included a great many celebrities as well as many Swiss compatriots of her husband Hans,

for many years now the cultural doyen of the Swiss community. It is to him and his children and grandchildren that we all extend our heartfelt sympathy in the sad loss. We shall remember Selma as a very strong personality of many talents, and those who were privileged to attend her last performance on 18th January this year "Don't cry over Onions — use Glasses" will remember her astonishing versatility. It was to be her swan song.

To me, it was her recitation of Kipling's "Queen Bess" at her birthday party last year that sent shivers down my spine — she was so magnificent and completely above her illness. She was a great friend of mine, and I am proud that one of her own favourite paintings "The old Circus Horse" hangs in my dining room.
