In Berne, too, he had given his services to various institutions. For a short time, he was president of Helvetas. He was also a council member of the Pestalozzi Foundation and, above all, of the Winston Churchill Foundation.

Impaired hearing made social life gradually more difficult for Dr Daeniker but he enjoyed with enthusiasm books on art, music and modern literature, too. He enjoyed excellent health right to the end

When I visited him last year I found him extremely well informed on all kinds of topics, and not least on the Swiss community in Great Britain to which he remained greatly attached.

We have lost a loyal friend but we shall remember him for his friendly and unpretentious ways and his quiet sense of humour.

His hobbies were collecting old maps and books on Africa - on which he became something of an expert - and curling. He played regularly at Richmond and Streatham ice rinks as well as competing in Scotland, Switzerland and other European countries. He was a member of a number of Swiss societies too.

It was after a game of curling against Scotland at Streatham ice rink on November 23 that Othmar slipped on a piece of wet wood in the car park and broke his leg.

As the fracture did not heal

properly, an operation became necessary. This took place on December 13, but he died suddenly due to a pulmonary em-

His friends and business associates will remember him as a kindhearted and gregarious man who was always ready to give a helpful hand and to enjoy a good get-together.

Our heartfelt sympathy goes to his wife, Helen, in her sad bereavement. May she find some consolation in the knowledge that their friends will remember Othmar with affection.

March 26, 9.30am, Professor Jeanne Hersch on "The central gesture in Jaspers' philosophy"; 1pm, Buffet lunch (at Imperial College); 3pm, Professor Gerhard Huber on "The Significance of Jaspers' Philosophy for our time."

The lectures will be followed by discussions. Tickets: Conference charge £6 (students free), buffet lunch £3.

Professor Jeanne Hersch will give a lecture on "Problems of youth today: the enemy is nihilism" on Monday, March 28 at 7pm in the Lecture Room of the Swiss Embassy, 16-18 Montagu Place, W1.

Jeanne Hersch was born in Geneva in 1910. She studied literature and philosophy in Geneva, Paris (Sorbonne), Heidelberg and Freiburg i/Br. For 21 years (1956-1977) she held the chair of philosophy at Geneva University.

In 1972 she received an Honoris Causa Doctorate of the University of St-Gall. Professor Hersch is a member of the Swiss Writers' Society, the Pen Club, the Swiss Socialist Party, the European Federalist Movement (since 1948) and the Council of the International Institute of Human Rights.

When, in 1980, riots broke out in the streets of Zurich, led by young people, the Swiss Federal Commission for Youth studied the problems and motivation of youth in Switzerland and the following year came up with a document entitled "Theses – a basis for discussion between authorities and young people."

However, many points of the

"Theses" were controversial and a few months later Professor Hersch published a booklet of "Anti-Theses", in which she develops her own sociological and philosophical theories as to the problems of youth today, not only in Switzerland but in the world at large.

The booklet was an immediate best-seller, over 50,000 copies being sold in Switzerland in less than a year, and nearly as many in Germany and France. An English version is being prepared.
