Mr Raymond Chappuis

IT is with great regret that we announce the death on October 8, of Mr Raymond Chappuis, of 7 Wain-a-Long Road, Salisbury, Wiltshire. He was 88.

Mr Chappuis was born in Paris in 1896. After finishing his schooling in Montreux, he did an apprenticeship with the Banque Populaire and then worked there and later in Zurich. In 1920, he came to London and started work with the Swiss Bank Corporation.

In 1921 he joined the Merchant Bankers Lazard Brothers & Co and retired in 1956.

Raymond Chappuis was active in the Swiss community in London, especially in the Swiss Mercantile Society whose president he became in 1961 in succession to Mr Oscar Grob.

He married Miss Alice Thierrin in 1923, and they had a daughter and a son. It is to his family, including three grandchildren, that we send our sincere condolences.

Although he has lived in Wiltshire for some years, together with his wife until she died, he still has a number of friends in London, and they as well as many others, will remember his gentle personality with affection.
