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
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numbers 51 (Wahligen) and 52 (Bertiswil) operate from Lucerne Bahnhof. Get off at the Rothenburg Lindau stop which is just opposite the Gasthof. Even on Sundays the combined routes offer a half hourly service. The Chaernsmatt can be relied on for a good lunch and of course ice creams and drinks during the afternoon. The ticket office will sell you single and multi ride tickets - the single tickets are of the traditional Edmondson card type.
