Resort fashions

It is always springtime somewhere in America, whatever the calendar may say. Here, in this country — which is a Continent — there is always a sunny paradise or other to be found. Happy the privileged mortals who can travel without cease, looking for the eternal spring which is always flowering in some corner of the United States.

Fortunately, these delightful holiday resorts are not reserved exclusively for the rich. On the contrary, to all who wish to work or rest, America offers the setting of the Californian riviera, tropical islands in the Carribean, orange-groves in Florida, the golden Arizona desert and the majestic snowcapped Rockies. In these lovely regions, called by Americans the «playgrounds of the nation», holiday-makers of all

The American woman too is a traveller by taste and temperament. Furthermore, she knows how to travel, better than her European sisters. She knows how to do without cum-
